Monetary	Remains accommodative given low inflation and slow economic recovery
Financial/foreign exchange	<ul> <li>Provision of liquidity support to the banking system by the National Reserve Bank of Tonga (NRBT) Board</li> <li>Exchange rate remains pegged against a basket of currencies (within a ±5 percent monthly adjustment limit)</li> <li>Committed to easing exchange control requirements if needed</li> </ul>
SME measures (last update 22 January 2021)	<ul> <li>Loan support and deferral of loan repayment:</li> <li>The Government of Tonga announced a three-month moratorium on Government Development Loans &amp; TC Gita Recovery Loan Fund.</li> <li>The National Reserve Bank of Tonga (NRBT) and commercial banks are assisting SMEs by (i) reducing or suspending the principal loan repayments to interest only loan repayments, (ii) restructuring loans to businesses that have reduced business hours, in affected sectors such as tourism and related industries, (iii) extending the terms of loans to reduce repayments, (iv) reducing loan interest rates on a case by case basis and (v) providing access to short-term funding.</li> </ul>

(individual breakdown unavailable)</li> <li>June 26, 2020: Second Round of ADB assistance from Strengthening Macroeconomic Resilience Program. \$12.2 million grant to help finance Covid-19 response<sup>14</sup></li> <li>October 23, 2020: The government has received Personal protective equipment (PPE) and other essential medical equipment provided by the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the World Health Organization (WHO), transported by the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP), and financed by the Asian Development Bank (ADB).<sup>15</sup></li> <li>December 14, 2020: USD10 million under the Pacific Disaster Resilience Program (Phase 3); 17 December 2020, USD0.25 million from the regional project, Supporting Recovery by Micro, Small and Medium-</li> </ul>

- sized Enterprises in the Pacific from the Effects of the COVID-19 Pandemic.(ADB)  $^{16}$
- December 16, 2020: USD30 million funding from the World Bank in support for Tonga's most vulnerable, under the Tonga: Supporting Recovery After Dual Shocks Development Policy Operation. It will support Tongan businesses, workers and vulnerable households to recover from the dual shocks caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and the recent typhoons.<sup>17</sup>
- 25 January 2021: USD9.95 million Rapid Credit Facility (RCF) from the IMF as emergency financing and debt relief. <sup>18</sup>
