
Purpose of this presentation

- To interpret those policy developments from an economic point of view.


Although less salient now, there is still plenty of trade policy intervention in medical goods

Implications for understanding trade policy and reform dynamics



- Impact of export curbs on supply chains.
- Potential for copycat behaviour during medical emergencies that affect many nations (key: trade policy dynamics when nations face simultaneous adverse shocks).
- Implications for designing policies to cope with demand surges created by medical emergencies.
- Implications of export curbs for willingness of importing nations to lower trade barriers as part of regional or multilateral trade deals.
