Who has benefited from trade liberalization in the Asia-Pacific region and why? The panel will identify the lessons for building inclusive and sustainable trade policies for the future in the region, by addressing the following questions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>How can the adverse effects of market and government failures be minimized? Does the solution lie in improving the coordination of decentralized decisions or in enhancing the coherence of centralized policies?</li> <li>If the problem is in the distribution of trade liberalization benefits, what policies should be adopted to improve inclusivity?
