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Cooperation

The environmentally sound disposal of counterfeit goods is complex and demands a multi-agency approach.

UN Inter-agency

WIPO and UNEP and other agencies should strengthen their collaboration to encourage the environmentally sound disposal of counterfeit goods.

ASEAN pilot project

- i) conduct a study on the environmental impact of IP infringing goods
- (ii) economic analysis of disposal options
- (iii) ongoing data collection/analysis
- (iv) technical assistance in legal framework development; awareness creation, training of stakeholders
- (v) enhanced right holder involvement

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- Strengthening of the legal framework on waste management
- Awareness-raising about the disposal of counterfeit goods
- Disposal guidelines for major type of counterfeit goods
- A study on the environmental impact of counterfeit goods

Capacity building
